
In the opening scene of the book, Anne tells Marilla that she and Diana have invented a code, a secret language of signs to communicate with each other. They put a light in the window, then they make flashes by passing paper in front of it. Without knowing it, they are using cryptography to send each other secret messages.

cryptography (from the Ancient Greek meaning 'hidden writing') is the practice of creating and understanding messages written in secret code

Cryptographers and cryptoanalysts

Secret systems of communication have always been important throughout world history. The outcome of wars and the fate of nations and great leaders were often decided by the success or failure of the activity of a group of expert code makers called cryptographers and code breakers called cryptoanalysts. Cryptographers took readable messages and turned them into codes using complex machines such as the German encryption machine, called the Enigma. Cryptoanalysts used machines and worked by hand to break the enemy's coded messages.

army during World Wars I and II. It had one hundred and three billion trillion possible settings for encoding messages and it was thought to be unbreakable. British and Polish code breakers, led by Alan Turing, designed a machine called the Bombe, which could understand Enigma's messages and gave the Allied forces important information which helped them win the second world war.


OVER TO YOU!

'Let's run and see who gets to the bed first,' said Anne.


The girls quickly got changed into their night clothes. Then they ran and jumped on the bed in the spare room. Suddenly someone moved and spoke in the bed.
