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### **MEET THE AUTHOR**

#### Hi, Robert, can you tell us a little about yourself?

I was born in Wales, grew up in Scotland, and then lived in England for many years. Now I live in Spain where I spend most of my time writing. This is the third reader I've written for Helbling Languages.

#### Where did you get the idea for this story?

*The Green Room* is about some young people at a summer theatre school. When I was a teenager, I wanted to be an actor so I joined the National Youth Theatre (NYT). The NYT is an organisation that encourages young people aged 14-21 to learn about the theatre. A lot of actors have been members including Orlando Bloom, Daniel Craig, Daniel Day-Lewis, Helen Mirren, and Matt Smith.

The first play I acted in was *Zigger Zagger* which was about football fans. It was an amazing experience so I decided to write a story about teenagers having a similar experience today.

#### Did you ever become a professional actor?

No, I wasn't good enough! But a few years later I wrote the music for some NYT plays and became a musical director. I wrote the music and songs for a lot of shows<sup>®</sup> before I started writing stories. One of the shows was about the actor James Dean, who is mentioned in the story.

#### Does the story have a message?

Yes, it does. But you'll have to read the story to find out what the message is.





'Someone who's in the same situation as you.'


'You won't tell them, will you?' Nathan said. 'Marc? Are you there? It's our secret, right? Promise?'


Lucy looked out the window.

Nathan raised his hand.


'It's an acting technique,' Nathan said. 'The actor *becomes* the character they are playing.'

In the afternoons, all the students worked on the show they were going to put on<sup>•</sup>. Marc went with the technical team to design the sets<sup>•</sup> and costumes while the others rehearsed. This year's Green Room production was called *What You Will*<sup>•</sup>. Dame Helen told everyone about it on the first afternoon.

*'What You Will* is the alternative title of William Shakespeare's play<sup>•</sup> *Twelfth Night*,' she said. 'And we are going to produce an alternative version of his play. We are going to start with Shakespeare's story and characters and we are going to add<sup>•</sup> our own words, music and dance.'

Dame Helen also said that tomorrow was the day for casting<sup>•</sup> the play. She told them that casting was another important part of being an actor. When directors *cast* a play or a film, they look for the right actors for the different characters or parts<sup>•</sup>.

Nathan knew that if he wanted a good part in the show, he needed to do some homework. When he got home that evening, he went to his room and downloaded Shakespeare's original version of *Twelfth Night*. Then he did some research. He discovered that Shakespeare wrote the play around 1601.

These first words are spoken by a character called Orsino. When Nathan started reading the script, he knew immediately that he wanted to play the part of Orsino.

The next morning, the cast list<sup>•</sup> was stuck to the noticeboard<sup>•</sup>. Nathan had the part of Orsino, Laura had the part of Viola, and Lucy had the part of Olivia. The three friends had the three most important parts in the play.

One minute later Nathan watched as Laura opened the front door to her house and walked inside.


'Mum? Dad? I'm home!' she shouted as she closed the front door behind her.


'My favourite,' Dad said when he saw the brownies.




